
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SUSTAINABLE SOJOURNS IN THE INDIAN SUBCONTINENT


Reni Pani, Satpura #03






SAFARIS IN THE LITTLE RANN OF **KUTCH**

The Rann of Kutch is a vast salt flat that stretches endlessly towards the horizon. Once upon a time it was a sea, which dried up. Today it's a unique biosphere, with one of a kind flora and fauna, and a winter roost for millions of migratory birds that come from Eurasia and Europe.

It is also home to several nomadic tribes and herdsmen, who wander these lands endlessly. Rann Riders by Kaafila is a beautifully designed retreat in the Little Rann of Kutch. The property draws on local design and materials, and employs people from the region.

Once upon a time, Bakhtapur was an important cross-roads on the Nepal-Tibet trade route. Thousands of merchants, scholars and explorers passed through the city, absorbing its culture and leaving behind their own influences.

Bhaktapur is famous for its monuments, particularly the Nyatapola and the former royal palace. It is also known for its vivid festivals featuring lively music and dances. One can often find potters and craftsmen busy at work as one roams through the streets. Today, the entire city is a UNESCO World Heritage Site.
